For the past 6 years, NCCT 's office space and all utilities have been generously donated by David Worth and The Worth Company in Stevens Point. We knew that eventually The Worth Company would outgrow their space and need the office back; Thankfully, being able to live rent-free for so long has helped NCCT save and grow our investments to a point that we could afford our own office space if necessary. Thus, NCCT is looking at several options to find a new office home within the next year: Lease or own the former DNR ranger station in



Whiting, rent office space elsewhere, or find a permanent home in an asyet unknown spot. The DNR ranger station building, if selected, requires significant interior renovations estimated to cost between \$25,000 and \$35,000. This leads me to our 2018 Annual Dinner, which was a resounding fundraising success!

SHILLINGLAW EASEMENT ADDITION: AN OPPORTUNITY FOR PERPETUAL HABITAT MANAGEMENT

John Shillinglaw, who currently has protected 220 acres under conservation easement in southern Waushara County, has added approximately 14 acres to his easement through NCCT. This 14-acre addition protects endangered Karner blue butterfly habitat and completely encompasses a tamarack-leatherleaf bog, which is a rare community this far south.

The Shillinglaw property will be managed to maintain the high-quality prairie and savannah habitat in perpetuity via an endowed fund held by the Natural Resources Foundation of Wisconsin. NCCT as easement holder will ensure the management takes place in accordance with a professionally-written land management plan. All NCCT's costs of overseeing such management (which will be completed by a qualified contractor) are covered through the endowment fund disbursed by the Foundation. If you are an easement donor concerned about invasive species degrading the quality of your property over time or just want to ensure the habitat is maintained (within the easement requirements), you may want to consider such a conservation endowment with the Natural Resources Foundation.

Justin currently serves as NCCT's Treasurer.




2017-18 ANNUAL REPORT


Annual giving in the last year increased by 59%, a significant amount. We thank all our contributors who helped make this growth possible. We anticipate this trend to continue with our increased outreach efforts.

NCCT's total assets showed a modest gain of \$1,696 over the previous fiscal year, but the total gain was depressed due to the loss of \$27,700 realized on the sale of the Ross-Linwood property during the 2017-18 Fiscal Year. The loss is due to the realized sale income being considerably below the appraised value of the property. After accounting for the loss on the sale, NCCT actually shows a healthy total asset growth of \$29,396 during the 2017-18 fiscal year.


The addition of the 88.4-acre Waypost Camp in December 2017, and Duncan Pledger's 80.4-acre property in March 2018 brings the total easement acreage held by NCCT to 4,138 at the end of the 2018 fiscal year.







While operating expenses for the 2017-18 Fiscal Year increased by \$26,750 from the prior fiscal year, \$23,790 of expenses were related to the Waypost Camp property and directly paid by the Marathon County EIF Grant, and therefore this additional expense did not negatively impact NCCT's operating reserves.



Fiscal Year 2016-17 Easement Acreage was incorrectly reported at 4,002 in last year's Annual Report. The correct figure for that year is 3,970 acres. The error is due to the inclusion of reserved areas (building zones) not actually part of easement lands.

MAJOR GIFTS AND GRANTS

We again wholeheartedly thank David Worth and The Worth Company for 6 great years providing beautiful and functional office, conference, and file-storage space and associated overhead expenses. NCCT has been able to grow and prosper as a result, so we are well positioned to take on future needs.

NCCT received the final Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) grant proceeds of \$2,118.18 for the Plover River Planning project that was initiated in 2015. This project mapped forest and wetlands in the Plover River watershed that could be eligible for protection with a conservation easement and resulted in outreach and educational materials sent to those landowners. Several interested landowners responded to these efforts, although no conservation easements have been completed to-date.

NCCT also received the final DNR Lake Protection Grant proceeds totaling \$6,579.75 for the Waypost Camp conservation easement. The Marathon County Environmental Impact Fund covered the remaining costs of the conservation easement, granting a total of \$33,224.50. In addition to all expenses incurred by NCCT, the grants covered the appraised value of the conservation easement for the land owner, Crossways Camping Ministries, which is a non-profit organization.

Henry Hoffman, one of our easement donors, sadly passed away in 2016. Henry generously gifted NCCT \$2,500 from his estate to be used for stewardship of his easement property.

For the first time since 2015, NCCT was the beneficiary of the Stevens Point Area Co-op's 1% Fridays grant program, through which we received \$499.98. We are grateful to the Co-op members for selecting NCCT to be a recipient again in November 2019!
